BPX TRIP REPORTS

Wheeler Geologic Area + Halfmoon Pass from South Fork Saguache TH

Wheeler Geologic Area did not disappoint!!

Seven CMC fine folks completed the Wheeler loop over Half Moon Pass in late August. It is a great alternative to just driving or walking in to see this unique area from Creede.

Hiking to our camp was saddened by all of the dead trees but that is a reality in many forested areas. On day 2, we headed up over Halfmoon Pass and took a right, to experience the loop in a counterclockwise direction which we all agreed was the best route. Seeing the area from every angle was spectacular. We stopped all along the way, taking pictures and oohing and ahhing. We had to finally declare the photo shoot over as clouds were beginning to collect. We scampered back over the pass and back to our campsite. What a great day. On day 3, we packed it up and headed back to the cars. This is a sight that is worth the long drive!





Colorado Trail - Segment 11 South from Mount Elbert TH

We went for a mellow fall backpacking trip at the foot of Mt Elbert, the start of Segment 11 of the Colorado Trail. Our sturdy crew set out on the trail as planned despite a very smoky Friday morning in Denver and cool, wet weather forecast in Leadville. The mist and occasional rain showers were pleasant actually as we hiked in to Herrington Creek, set up camp, and then day hiked to the beaver ponds near Lily Pond. We were amazed by how many large trees those creatures can cut down, drag about, and build with. Several of us spotted a skittish bear across the ponds as it quickly ran away.

We made it back to our tents and enjoyed some sunshine before a storm came through with booming thunder and hail. Friday night was chilly! Saturday dawned clear and promised to warm up. We hiked up to about 12,500 ft on Mt Elbert, with views obscured by smoke at first but slowly improving. We relaxed in some rocks at the "top" and enjoyed the warm sun and views of Twin Lakes and surrounding mountains. Mt Columbia and Mt Harvard to the south gleamed white.

The third day dawned warmer. We had an easy hike back to the cars with at least seven deer and a lot more yellow and orange leaves than when we had hiked in. I got five more miles of my CO Trail section hike, and it seems that a couple other folks might have been inspired to start theirs.





Pine Creek Adventure (AKA Lake Ann Plan B)

Our planned BPX trip to Lake Ann in the Collegiate Peaks Wilderness took a sudden turn when the La Plata Fire—sparked by an improperly extinguished campfire near the 14er—erupted right next to our destination. With closures spreading and the prospect of hiking deep into a one-way drainage with a wildfire nearby, we pivoted.

Instead, we headed north to Pine Creek Trailhead, just outside Buena Vista. We hiked 4 miles to the intersection of the Pine Creek Trail and the Colorado Trail. Our new home: a wide, beautiful valley with flowing water, mountain views, and plenty of space for tents.

We then ventured west for an exploratory hike, rewarded with views of Mt Belford and Mt Oxford. An enormous cumulonimbus cloud formed and we hustled back to camp just in time for an afternoon storm. We had a nice window for dinner and moose-watching over the meadow, where a mama and calf grazed (at a safe distance).

The next morning, armed with maps and curiosity, we set out south along the CT to find Rainbow Lake—an off-trail alpine gem. The route required map reading, bushwhacking, and teamwork, but our efforts paid off. We emerged at the lake, with big views and the satisfaction of having navigated there ourselves. After lunch, we returned to our trailhead, tired but smiling.

Sustainability, Recycling, Leave No Trace

Disposing of Bear Spray Containers

- How to dispose of expired or used cans of bear spray correctly?
- Move to an open area away from people, pets, and buildings.
- Simply empty the container before disposing of it in the regular city trash pick-up. To do this, press the valve and release all contents and pressure. Be sure to stand upwind in a well ventilated area when doing this so you won't harm yourself or others in the process.
- This practice is a great way to train yourself and others how to use the spray.
