

## The A-Frame

Do you know about the little brown shelter on the east side of Pikes Peak, now known as the A-Frame? It was built by the Forest Service in 1964, first called the Adirondack Shelter in the tradition of shelters built in that area of NY. Materials were flown in by helicopter. In 1984 the Pikes Peak Group did major construction, installing a new foundation and floor, reconstruction of walls and roof and installed a wood burning heater. With the heater, trees were being cut down, ashes dumped nearby, so they removed it in 1991. That same year the club took over its maintenance for the Forest Service.



Records have been sparse about its upkeep, but in 2008 the shingles were replaced and it was also repainted. In its location at 11,900 ft, it tends to take a beating from mother nature. But for climbers looking for a sunrise summit, it is a strategic starting point, 3.4 miles from the summit. For hikers not ready for the different moods of the mountain, it is a storm shelter from July lightning, August hail, and bitter January winds.


In the summer of 2022, the club planned another refurbishment with new shingles, 2x6x14 ft treated front support boards, and repainted it inside and out. Over a period of 7 days and 37 individuals' hard work, it was a very successful project.

On July 29th, 16 volunteers returned to clean up the old shingles left from last years construction. Volunteers were shuttled to the top of Pikes Peak by: Bob Hostetler, Mark Yeardon, Dave Anderson, Bruce Weiner, and Bill Houghton. Folks retrieving the shingles and hiked down to the A-Frame, loaded their packs, hiked down Barr Trail to the Cog's Mountain View siding, unloaded, then hiked to the Barr TH where they were picked up and returned to their cars. Altogether, it was a long, but wonderful 15-mile downhill hike.

It's such an awesome place to stay overnight; all the lights from the city below at night then add that to a beautiful sunrise. It's spectacular. We'll continue to take care of it; watch for your opportunity to help.





# **HAMS Starts in November**

The Pikes Peak Group High Altitude Mountaineering School will start in November. This is a course designed for those climbers who want to go beyond the 14ers to take on high altitude (15,000' plus) and glaciated mountains. Classroom sessions will take place on Wednesdays 11/8, 11/15, 11/29, 12/6, and 12/13, and include such topics as equipment, medical concerns, nutrition and menu planning, fitness and training, organizing an expedition, and group dynamics. Field sessions are tentatively scheduled for 1/7, 1/21, 2/10-11, and 2/24-25; they will cover such topics as roped travel, crevasse rescue, climbing alpine ice, and winter camping. A graduation climb of Mt. Rainier will take place at the end of the course. Completion of Basic Mountaineering School (all modules) or equivalent, plus experience putting those skills into practice in the field are prerequisites for the course. Cost for the class is \$225. # **Upcoming Pikes Peak Group Classes**

#### **PPG WTS - Intro to Backpacking**

Mon, Aug 14, 2023 - Mon, Aug 21, 2023

Backpacking is another way to experience the outdoors by carrying all the gear you need to travel, eat and sleep in pursuit of your adventure. It can take you to a distant location from the trailhead, help you enjoy an activity (summit attempt, alpine lake fishing, etc.), or serve as the main goal itself, such as hiking a long trail like the Colorado Trail. Carrying all the gear you need to travel, eat, sleep, stay dry, treat injuries, stay found, cook food, treat water, and enjoy yourself may be intimidating—but taken one step at a time—is very manageable. This class focuses on the basics in a lecture/discussion format and concludes with an overnight backpacking trip to put our new knowledge into action. Safety and fun are key elements of this class. Prerequisite: PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals completion or equivalent. Cost: \$25 for PPG members, \$50 for all others.

## **ARC Pro Sport Lead Climbing**

Sat, Aug 26, 2023 - Sun, Aug 27, 2023

This class will teach participants the skills needed to safely lead sport climbs on their own, including basic leading technique, setting up a top-rope anchor, cleaning the anchor and rapping or lowering down, advanced lead belaying, bailing off a route, climbing movement, and falling practice. It is taught over 2 full field days at a climbing crag. Cost: \$95 for PPG members, \$115 for all others.

### **ARC Pro Traditional Lead Climbing**

Sat, Sep 9, 2023 - Sun, Sep 10, 2023

This class will equip students with the skills and knowledge needed to start leading single-pitch traditional rock routes on their own. Over the course of two full days at an outdoor crag we will review traditional gear and anchors then will focus in detail on the protection system and leading strategies. Students will mock-lead single-pitch trad climbs (on a separate belay) with instructor evaluation of the entire process. We will cover lead belaying and follower belaying skills. Students will do some improvised aid climbing on gear they have placed in order to gain confidence in their own gear placements. Cost: \$95 for PPG members, \$125 for all others.

### **Intro to Technical Canyoneering**

Wed, Sep 13, 2023 - Thu, Oct 5, 2023

Have you completed Intro to Desert Trekking & Canyoneering and BMS Rock? Take those skills to the next level. Learn proper gear, safety, and technique for technical canyoneering. The target audience is anyone new to technical slot canyons. Prior climbing and scrambling skills are required. Basic climbing gear is also required. Attendance at the classroom session and both local field sessions will be required to attend the Utah trip. Completion of all sessions is required to earn the badge. Cost: \$250 for PPG members, \$350 for all others.

#### **Intro to Desert Trekking & Canyoneering**

Wed, Sep 20, 2023 - Sun, Oct 1, 2023

If you have only been hiking in the high altitude of CO, there is another world out there. When you have climbed enough peaks to wonder what other environments, the next step for you may be desert terrain. Come learn the proper gear, safety, and entry level techniques for basic desert hiking and basic canyoneering. There are many nuances to this environment that should warrant a safe approach such as provided by this class. This year's desert trip is planned for the San Rafael Reef in Utah. A strong fitness level to go on daily full day hikes with scrambling on moderate exposure in hot terrain, squeezing through narrows, hiking in loose sand, and wading through water is required for the field sessions. The field sessions will be progressive in nature to build on skills. Attendance at the classroom session and local field session will be required to attend the Utah trip. Attendance at all sessions will be required to earn the badges. Cost: \$150 for PPG members, \$250 for all others.

#### **PPG WTS – Wilderness Fundamentals**

Mon, Sep 25, 2023 - Sat, Sep 30, 2023

The Wilderness Fundamentals class is an introduction of important skills and back country knowledge to enable participants to independently plan and safely implement a day's outing in the great outdoors—away from civilization and all it provides. This class is a pre-requisite for many of our other PPG courses and will provide participants with a copy of *Mountaineering: Freedom of the Hills* that will be referenced in other courses! Make sure you have a good foundation of the basics before expanding your outdoor skillset. Cost: \$35 for PPG members, \$45 for all others.

#### **ARC Pro Introduction to Self-Rescue**

Sat, Oct 14, 2023 - Sun, Oct 15, 2023

Students will be introduced to basic self-rescue skills applicable to single-pitch technical climbing to include a climber pick-off, escaping a belay, and passing a knot on rappel. Cost: \$95 for PPG members, \$115 for all others.
