Upcoming Pikes Peak Group Classes

ARC Pro Traditional Gear & Anchors Sat, Mar 23, 2024 - Sun, Mar 24, 2024 and Sat, Apr 6, 2024 - Sun, Apr 7, 2024 Students will learn about the various types of rock protection to include natural protection, passive protection (nuts, hexes) and active protection (cams); and how to place and incorporate pieces of protection into anchors. We will discuss climbing anchors, to include top-rope, belay and rappel anchors. The student will learn the concepts of building an anchor according to the EARNEST principles; to include placement and evaluation of protection, fall forces, direction of pull, rigging methods and knots for anchoring. At the completion of the course the student should know how build an anchor using natural or placed protection- adequate for belaying or rappelling- and how to evaluate others' anchors. They will rappel off an anchor that they have built and rigged. Cost: \$95 for PPG members, \$125 for all others.

PPG BMS – Advanced Snow Climbing

Learning to climb steep snow will help you reach your winter alpine objectives. Steep alpine snow is frequently encountered in the mountains during winter ascents. Course covers: gear overview, trip planning, ascending/descending with an ice axe and crampons, avalanche risk review, self-arresting and snow climbing practice. Cost: \$80 for PPG members, \$160 for all others.

Land Navigation

This course is the second course in the Pikes Peak Group's Wilderness Trekking School (WTS) curriculum. This course may also be a prerequisite for trips or other schools. Prerequisite: PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals. Cost: \$30 for PPG members, \$60 for all others.

Crack Climbing Clinic – North Table Mountain

We will discuss and demonstrate basic crack-climbing techniques for the various crack sizes and spend the day practicing on top-rope. Cost: \$35 for PPG members, \$50 for all others.

Rock Scrambling

This course is the first course in the Pikes Peak Group's Basic Mountaineering School (BMS) curriculum. Rock Scrambling consists of a set of skills that fill a gap between on or off-trail hiking and technical climbing. Skills include assessing hazards and decision making, scrambling techniques, and assessing and choosing off-trail routes in scrambling terrain. Prerequisite: PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals. Cost: \$45 for PPG members, \$145 for all others.

ARC Pro Intermediate Self Rescue

This class builds upon and expands self-rescue skills taught in the ARC Pro Introduction to Self Rescue class by teaching skills applicable on multipitch terrain. Prerequisite: ARC Pro Introduction to Self Rescue. Cost: \$95 for PPG members, \$125 for all others.

Rock Climbing

This course is the second course in the Pikes Peak Group's Basic Mountaineering School (BMS) curriculum. Prerequisite: PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals. Cost: \$65 for PPG members, \$85 for all others.

PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals

The Wilderness Fundamentals class is an introduction of important skills and back country knowledge to enable participants to independently plan and safely implement a day's outing in the great outdoors - away from civilization and all it provides. This class is a pre-requisite for many of our other PPG courses and will provide participants with a copy of Mountaineering: Freedom of the Hills that will be referenced in other courses! Make sure you have a good foundation of the basics before expanding your outdoor skillset. Cost: \$45 for PPG members, \$90 for all others.

ARC Pro Traditional Lead Climbing

This class will equip students with the skills and knowledge needed to start leading single-pitch traditional rock routes on their own. Over the course of two full days at an outdoor crag we will review traditional gear and anchors then will focus in detail on the protection system and leading strategies. Students will mock-lead single-pitch trad climbs (on a separate belay) with instructor evaluation of the entire process. We will cover lead belaying and follower belaying skills. Students will do some improvised aid climbing on gear they have placed in order to gain confidence in their own gear placements. Cost: \$95 for PPG members, \$125 for all others.



PPG WTS - Intro to Backpacking

Backpacking is another way to experience the outdoors by carrying all the gear you need to travel, eat and sleep in pursuit of your adventure. It can take you to a distant location from the trailhead, help you enjoy an activity (summit attempt, alpine lake fishing, etc.) or serve as the main goal itself, such as hiking a long trail like the Colorado Trail. Carrying all the gear you need to travel, eat, sleep, stay dry, treat injuries, stay found, cook food, treat water, and enjoy yourself may be intimidating - but taken one step at a time - is very manageable. This class focuses on the basics in a lecture/discussion format and concludes with an overnight backpacking trip to put our new knowledge into action. Safety and fun are key elements of this class. Cost: \$35 for PPG members, \$70 for all others.

RMFI Trail and Restoration Project Opportunities





Are you ready to bring your CMC experience to the next level and become a trip leader?
