### **PPG Trip Leader School Director Needed**



The PPG seeks a motivated and engaging Trip Leader to help mentor aspiring volunteer CMC trip leaders and guide them through the certification process to become a CMC Trip Leader. This position is for "general" trip leader training and not for technical trip leader certification, which includes most rock climbing activities per the CMC Leader Manual. The TLS leader helps future trip leaders prioritize the physical and emotional safety of their group, fostering a culture of belonging, and planning all logistical aspects of the trip.

- Duties include promoting awareness of the TL certification program and the steps involved, tracking prospective TL progress, hosting quarterly scenario field days, ensuring the PPG TL program follows the CMC guidance (trip leader manual), and championing the efforts of prospective trip leaders to complete their certification and serve as an active CMC Trip Leader.
- Required skills include trip leading experience, current CMC Trip Leader badge, current CMC Wilderness First Aid Badge, and a willingness to engage and share trip leading skills, requirements, responsibilities, and the fulfillment one feels in giving back when leading trips.

### Pikes Peak Prepares for the 2025 Season

Pikes Peak-America's Mountain is gearing up for another exciting season, with shuttle tickets and timed entry permits going on sale April 1. This year, expanded shuttle stops will provide easier access to popular spots like Crystal Creek Reservoir, Glen Cove, and Devils Playground. The shuttle will run daily from May 23 to August 10, while timed entry permits will be required for those driving up the highway from May 23 to September 30. Admission prices have increased slightly to support maintenance and visitor services, with general admission now \$18 for adults and \$8 for children. The North Slope Recreation Area, including Crystal Creek Reservoir, will open May 1, though North and South Catamount reservoirs will remain closed for repairs. Visitors are encouraged to plan ahead, check conditions, and book reservations. If you are hiking up the peak and get into an emergency situation, read about the "Hiker Safe Room" on that page.

## **Upcoming PPG Classes**

### **ARC Pro Traditional Gear & Anchors**

Sat, Mar 22, 2025 - Sun, Mar 23, 2025

Students will be introduced to traditional gear placement and will learn how to use natural and traditional protection to build safe climbing anchors. Students will learn about the various types of rock protection to include natural protection, passive protection (nuts, hexes) and active protection (cams); and how to place and incorporate pieces of protection into anchors. We will discuss climbing anchors, to include top-rope, belay and rappel anchors. The student will learn the concepts of building an anchor according to the EARNEST principles; to include placement and evaluation of protection, fall forces, direction of pull, rigging methods and knots for anchoring. Members: \$95; Guests: \$125.

### **PPG BMS - Advanced Snow Climbing**

Thu, Apr 10, 2025 - Sun, Apr 20, 2025

This course is the fourth course in the Pikes Peak Group's Basic Mountaineering School (BMS) curriculum. Learning to climb steep snow will help you reach your winter alpine objectives. Steep alpine snow is frequently encountered in the mountains during winter ascents. Course covers: gear overview, trip planning, ascending/descending with an ice axe and crampons, avalanche risk review, and self-arresting and snow climbing practice. The PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals course and either AIARE Level 1 or AIARE Avalanche Rescue course are the prerequisites for this course. Students must have earned the Wilderness Trekking School Student and either AIARE Level 1 or AIARE Avalanche Rescue badges to be able to register for this course. Members: \$90; Guests: \$150.

**Land Navigation** 

Wed, Apr 16, 2025 - Sat, Apr 26, 2025

This is the second course in the Pikes Peak Group's Wilderness Trekking School (WTS) curriculum. Discussions include maps, compass, orienteering, estimating distance, interpreting map symbols, properly reading topo contour lines, learning about declination, sighting, taking a bearing, and technologies such as GPS. You'll also participate in class exercises using a map and compass. Students must then participate in the associated field session to receive credit for completing the overall course. Members: \$35; Guests: \$45.

### **Crack Climbing Clinic – North Table Mountain**

Sat, Apr 19, 2025

We will discuss and demonstrate basic crack-climbing techniques for the various crack sizes and spend the day practicing on top-rope. Participants should already have climbing experience and be proficient with belaying and the basic climbing safety system. Members: \$35; Guests: \$50.

### **Basic Alpine Climbing**

Wed, Apr 30, 2025 - Sat, May 10, 2025

This is the first course in the Pikes Peak Group's Basic Mountaineering School (BMS) curriculum. Basic Alpine Climbing consists of a set of skills that fill a gap between on or off-trail hiking and technical climbing. Skills include assessing hazards and decision making, traditional scrambling techniques, and assessing and choosing off-trail routes in alpine/scrambling terrain. The PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals Course is the prerequisite for this course. Students must have earned the Wilderness Fundamentals course badge or an equivalent CMC Wilderness Trekking School badge to be able to register for this course. Members: \$45; Guests: \$90.

### **ARC Pro Intermediate Self Rescue**

Sat, May 3, 2025 - Sun, May 4, 2025

This class builds upon and expands self-rescue skills taught in the ARC Pro Introduction to Self Rescue class by teaching skills applicable on multipitch terrain. We will review the skills from the ARC Pro Intro Self Rescue class, then move into new skills more applicable in multipitch terrain. Students will learn how to assist a follower using hauling methods, lower a climber from a top belay with a knot pass, and descend multiple pitches with another climber using tandem rappels. Members: \$105; Guests: \$125.

**Rock Climbing** 

Mon, May 5, 2025 - Sat, May 17, 2025

This is the second course in the Pikes Peak Group's Basic Mountaineering School (BMS) curriculum. The PPG WTS - Wilderness Fundamentals Course is the prerequisite for this course. Students must have earned the Wilderness Trekking School Student badge or have been granted a waiver to be able to register for this course. Members: \$75; Guests: \$95.
