Conservation Corner

Indigenous Perspective on Western Waters

At the recent Telluride Mountainfilm Festival, a group of guest speakers gathered to discuss the issues of water allocation and the Colorado River. The panel included Manuel Heart (Ute Mountain Ute Tribal Chairman), Lorelei Cloud (Vice Chair of the Southern Ute Tribal Council, as well as the first indigenous person to serve on the Colorado Water Conservation Board), Ben Masters and Quannah ChasingHorse (Director/Writer and Narrator, respectively, of a new documentary, The American Southwest.)

The 1922 Colorado River Compact is an agreement that provides operating guidelines and water distribution among seven western states. The current guidelines are set to expire at the end of 2026. The allocations were made over 100 years ago during some of the wettest years on record. And the projected growth in these seven states over the span of a century was expected to be two million people when in fact 40 million people currently live in these states.

The Colorado River is the hardest working river in the world. The average drop of water is used 20 times and some of this water never returns to the Colorado River. Not only is 80 percent of the water used for agricultural purposes, one-third of the alfalfa grown in the lower Colorado River Basin goes to foreign countries. We are in a 25-year drought and 19 percent of the river water is lost due to climate change. The 100-year-old framework for the Colorado River Basin is not working today.

According to Ute Mountain Ute Tribal Chairman Manuel Heart, there are 30 federally recognized tribes in the Colorado River Basin. It was not until 1924 that tribal members were recognized and became citizens of the United States. They have not used their water rights; they have not been compensated for these rights and there is no water delivery system. The continuing struggle facing Colorado River tribal members from benefiting from their vast water rights is referred to as the four "U's" of tribal water – undeveloped, unquantified, unused and uncompensated.

The tribal leaders at this panel discussion urged all of us to advocate not only what we use, but for what wildlife and plant life need. We also need to recognize what was happening in the Colorado River Basin before the United States became a country. Indigenous knowledge about stewardship of the land is conservation. Water is considered a relative and we must take care of it as if it is our family. This is the moment to try and design a new framework, a new ethic about water use. There is enough water. It just is not used wisely.

Our Lawmakers are Real Estate Agents ... Again



A disastrous amendment to the House version of the budget bill would have sold over 500,000 acres of public land. Fortunately, the amendment failed, but now the proposed public land sell off is back with vengeance in the current version of the budget bill due to a Senate proposal. This effort has been spearheaded by Senator Mike

Lee of Utah. According to the Wilderness Society, the provision in question mandates the sale of between 2 and 3 million acres, but the provision contains very limited exemptions. Millions of acres of federal public land in Colorado could be vulnerable to a sell off if this version of the bill passes. Eligible lands on the Western Slope include the Lunch Loops mountain bike trail system in Grand Junction, Durango's Animas Mountain recreational space, land along Highway 550 between Durango and Silverton, land north of Palisade in the Book Cliffs, and land near the Blue Mesa Reservoir.

How Do I Find Out About New Trips After They're Posted?

The CMC website has a nice feature where you can get notified of new trips right after they're added or in a daily digest or in a weekly digest. Here's the steps for setting that up.

- 1) Login to your CMC account and click on "My Profile" under your name on the upper right.
- 2) Scroll down the page and click on "Edit Profile".
- 3) Scroll down the page to "Alerts and Notifications Preferences" and select your desired "Update Frequency". You'll also need to choose at least one activity. See the example below.
- 4) Scroll down the page and click on "Save".
