## **Hiking the Camel Back Trail**

After visiting the Juan Rivera panel last fall, I wanted to hike the Camel Back as well. Finally went back, yesterday.

Looking at the summit register I found that only two non-CMCers have signed in since 2022 (there were also some recent footprints most of the way up). I was delighted to see the 2022 names included Charlie Winger, An Keil, Babs Schmerler, as well as Cynthia Adams.

This seems to be a CMC West Slope thing.

Challenging route-finding, since the trail disappears in a number of places ... but lots of cairns. Class 2, I'd say, with patient route-finding.

After a bit of experimentation, I think the best approach road is the "Canyon Rim Cutoff", starting from Banner Road/CO 348. Not named on any maps I have, but signed here and there as you drive. You need moderately high clearance - Tow-me-home Road and Roubideau Rim Road both require really high clearance. Tow-me-home starting from Cedar Rd is more direct, if you have the vehicle for it.

Gorgeous country - I'd go back!

#### **Conservation Corner**

It seems as if every day there is another news story involving efforts by the current administration to desecrate our public lands - national treasures that generations of Americans enjoy. According to Politico, over 4,400 federal public lands stewards have been or will be fired. The U.S. Forest Service is firing 3,400 employees (10 percent of its workforce.) The Department of Interior is terminating 2,300 employees including 1,000 Park Service employees. Additionally, 370 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service employees have been dismissed. The USFWS firings disproportionately targeted biologists and natural resource professionals.

This government sponsored cruelty is putting our public lands at risk of harm and resource exploitation. A New York Times reporter spoke with a wilderness ranger in the Cascade Mountains who lost her position as part of this effort to "trim the fat." The ranger, along with six coworkers, cared for 500 miles of popular trails. In one recent season they monitored 70 backcountry toilets disposing of more than 1000 piles of human waste and carried out 600 pounds of trash. The firings have also disrupted the lives of the patriotic caretakers of our public lands leaving some without housing and many without future employment plans.

The importance of protecting our beloved public lands is not a partisan issue. According to the 2024 Conservation in the West Poll conducted by Colorado College, 52% of Republicans, 72% of Independents and 89% of Democrats favor conservation efforts over energy production. National Parks and other incredible landscapes are shared and enjoyed by all Americans, regardless of age, background, political beliefs or religion.

Also of importance are the economic benefits of caring for our public lands. The Durango Herald reported that Mesa Verde National Park generated 75.6 million dollars in economic output in 2023. Visitors in nearby communities spent 60 million dollars in the same year. The economy has changed in western Colorado. Data collected by Colorado Mesa University revealed that outdoor recreation directly accounts for 8.4% of employment in Mesa County and 4.8% of gross domestic products.

Given the current state of disruption, many of us fear for the future and feel helpless. Ecological grief can be overwhelming especially for those of us who love and cherish our backcountry experiences. How can we heal ourselves and protect our fragile public lands? Please consider taking action. There has never been a more important time to get involved. Aspen Public Radio recently interviewed Senator Michael Bennet and he made it clear that the voices of the people in western communities and throughout the Rocky Mountain region must be heard.

There are many ways to get involved. The simplest way is to send a message to Congressman Jeff Hurd via this Wilderness Workshop. Another way is to call Representative Hurd. He may be reached at 202-225-4676. Finally, if you prefer "boots on the ground" involvement, non-profit organizations such as the San Juan Mountain Association and Colorado Canyons Association, vital partners of the San Juan National Forest and local BLM offices, are continually recruiting volunteers.
