Conservation Corner

The History of the 2001 Roadless Rule

The Roadless Rule restricts logging and road construction on 58.5 million acres managed by the Forest Service. Research consistently demonstrates that roadless areas are vital for safeguarding biodiversity, wildlife habitats, and migration corridors. These landscapes often connect designated wilderness areas and national parks, enabling unrestricted wildlife movement across broader landscapes. Furthermore, the rule plays a significant role in preventing soil erosion, reducing water pollution, and enhancing climate resilience.

Initially proposed in 2000, the Roadless Rule received over 1.6 million public comments, with approximately 90 percent expressing support. Its scheduled implementation in March 2001 was postponed by two months under the Bush administration, and legal challenges followed. In 2006, a judicial decision upheld the rule. While the Trump administration exempted the Tongass National Forest from these protections, the Biden administration reinstated them in 2023.

The Secretary of Agriculture recently announced its proposal to rescind the Roadless Rule, and initiated a 21-day public comment period—much shorter than the customary 60 days—to solicit feedback. This comment period ended on September 19th. Should the USDA proceed with the rescission, more than 25,000 miles of hiking trails, nearly 9,000 climbing routes, and over 10,000 miles of mountain biking trails could be affected. (Colorado and Idaho have their own roadless rules and should not be impacted by a rescission of the 2001 Roadless Rule.)

Update on the Colorado Hookless Cactus



The Colorado Hookless Cactus, which grows in the Colorado and Gunnison River basins in western Colorado and their tributary canyons, was classified as a threatened species by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in 1979. The species has now been officially removed from the endangered species list. Its recovery has been managed through collaborative efforts of the Bureau of Land Management, the Colorado Natural Heritage Program, and the Denver Botanical Gardens. Found in high desert, semi-arid regions, this species is recognized for its distinctive pink flowers that bloom in late April and early May.
