Bobcats Section Chair Musings

As the seasons change and winter finally settles in, many of us are gearing up for snowshoeing, backcountry skiing, and other cold-weather adventures. Before heading out, please take a moment to think about avalanche safety.

The **Colorado Avalanche Information Center (CAIC)** is an excellent resource for understanding current conditions.

Their website and app provide daily forecasts, information on avalanche likelihood by elevation and slope aspect, and summaries of recent avalanche activity. Be sure to check their updates whenever you plan to travel in the backcountry.

Keep in mind that avalanche-prone terrain generally falls on slopes between **25 and 45** degrees, with the greatest risk typically on slopes between **30 and 45** degrees. Navigation tools like **Gaia GPS**, **CalTopo**, and **onX Backcountry** offer color-coded slope-angle overlays that make it easy to identify hazardous terrain both during trip planning and while traveling in the field. These tools are incredibly helpful for evaluating terrain, choosing safer routes, and making informed decisions in real time or offline.

In addition, **onX Backcountry** includes an **Avalanche Runout Simulator** and **Potential Release Area overlays**, which can further help you identify where avalanches may start and where they might travel-valuable information for anyone exploring winter terrain.

The CMC also offers the **Avalanche Terrain Avoidance (ATA) course**, which consists of a half-day classroom session and a half-day field session. The course teaches you how to recognize where avalanche danger may exist, and, most importantly, how to avoid it. You'll learn how to use reliable information sources and route-planning tools to stay out of harms way.

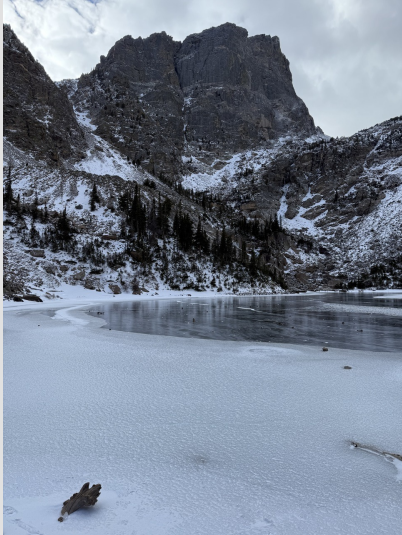

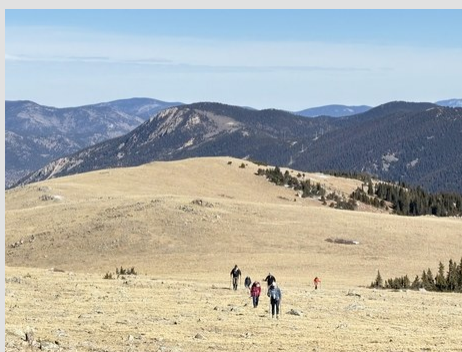
Hiking Steep Loose Slopes by Chris Larson

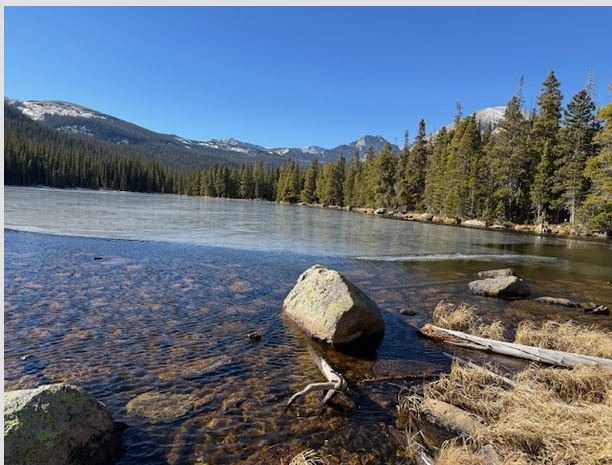
